



The Next Decadal Plan - Your Voice Is Needed!

Many of you may have heard about the next Decadal Plan, just begun across the country. As ECRs you're probably focused on other quite important things right now, like finishing that paper and applying for jobs so you can continue your career. Keep doing that; it's important! But perhaps I can convince you to redirect just a little of your valuable time elsewhere.

Consider this: the upcoming Decadal Plan will shape the next 10 years of astronomy in this country. It will set priorities that determine the kinds of opportunities you have. In your next proposal, be it for data or resources or a fellowship, you'll claim "[My research area] has been identified as a priority research area for Australian astronomy, and the proposed program here will make significant inroads in addressing these important questions." Unless of course your particular research interests aren't identified as a national priority.

Let me be frank: the money, jobs, etc are always skewed towards the priority areas.

So, get involved! It's in your interest. Get active! The senior people leading the different working groups can't do all the work. Highly visible, enthusiastic, smart, energetic young people will be noticed. If you want to know what's discussed behind closed doors on review committees and selection panels, it's these kinds of things that often separate otherwise equally compelling candidates. If you want an edge, here's your opportunity.

ECR Membership Update

The ECR Chapter has grown rapidly since its formation earlier in 2013. We currently have more than 70 members, including 15 students and 14 senior mentors. We also boast gender parity, indicating a strong presence of women in the early-career researcher stage of their careers. 2013 ECR Summer Workshop – How to be an effective referee

On the 29th November the new ECR chapter ran its first career development workshop, hosted by the Sydney Institute for Astronomy and generously sponsored by the ARC Centre of Excellence for All-sky Astrophysics. Forty early career researchers from institutes in New South Wales, Queensland and the ACT attended a very informative and enjoyable day of interactive classes in refereeing of journal publications and grant proposals.

Participants listened to talks by expert speakers on topics that included the peer-review process, writing a referee report for the first time, writing in different fields, and refereeing project & fellowship grants. Group activity sessions occupied most of the day, with ECRs forming reviewer panels for submitted journal articles and grant proposals. Following an hour of discussion and guidance by our experts, each group presented its report and recommendation,

often reassuringly reaching similar conclusions.

Attendees had a range of experience, from PhD students who may have not yet refereed a paper to senior post-docs who wanted to fine-tune their skills. Feedback on the workshop was overwhelmingly positive and we had some great suggestions from chapter members for future events like this. Stay tuned for further career development workshops run by the chapter, and for the ASA Early Career Researcher Workshop in winter 2014.
